- c) What are the key differences of US and UK sitcoms? How does the social context of The IT Crowd and Friends illustrate these differences? [10]

In the episode of Luther shown, to what extent do character types, stereotypical readings and narrative structure play a part?

Compare the presentation of Luther and The Sweeney. How has the genre of TV Crime Drama evolved? [30]

Candidates may wish to explore:

- Characterisation
- Plot
- Social context and how the dramas are indicative of their specific era.

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
